Hedgehog tracks and signs

Learn how to identify hedgehog droppings and tracks. Hedgehogs can be difficult to detect, but searching for their footprints is a good way of discovering if they are around.

I imagine you wont have all the materials at home so I am sure you can be creative with substitutes!




What do Hedgehogs eat? Set a pitfall trap.

A pitfall trap is a simple device used to catch small animals - particularly insects and other invertebrates. It consists of a container buried so that its top is level with the surface of the ground. Leave the trap overnight and see what you have trapped. The animals collected with be the type of animals and

Link your gardens

Is your garden Hedgehog friendly?

Creating a **log pile** for hedgehogs creates a safe, secure site for breeding or hibernating. Collect any old dead wood from your garden and pile up in a quiet undisturbed corner. Compost heaps, leaf piles and ponds are also great habitats for hedgehogs.
